**Creating Shalom in the New Year**

In this season, when we celebrate the birth of the world and the beginning of the New Year, we can also engage in self-examination. This process of reflection can help us understand anew what is most important to us. Let's consider our name: "Har Shalom", mountain of peace. What do we do to fulfill our name? How are we bringing shalom into the world? By "shalom", I mean the broadest sense of the word: working for justice, increasing opportunity for all, helping the needy, giving emotional support, and working for peace among peoples and nations.

As a community, we are supporting partners in Family Promise, an effort to provide temporary emergency housing for families in transition. Fees for the class are \$18 for Har Shalom members, \$60 for non-members.

Beginnings of Judaism starts Saturday, September 21

“Beginnings of Judaism,” an adult education class, will begin this fall. We will be using a DVD and book that has 24, 1/2 hour lectures by Professor Isaiah M. Gafni. He teaches history at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. Toba Winston will lead the class and discussion. The history begins around 20 centuries before The Common Era (BCA) and ends about 500 to 600 CE, the date the Babylonian Talmud was completed. The discussion will delve into these beginnings and the effects they have on modern day Judaism as a religion, a culture and a nationality.

The class begins September 21, from 1 to 3 pm, and continues on consecutive Saturdays (excluding first Saturdays), ending on January 11, 2014. That includes skipping 12/28 and all first Saturdays of the month. Cost for 12 weeks of classes for members of Har Shalom will be \$18; non-members \$60. Checks may be made out to Har Shalom, annotated “Beginnings of Judaism class” in the comments section of the check and mailed to Har Shalom, P.O Box 7581, Missoula, MT 59807.

Friday, Sept 6, 6 pm Greenough Park

We’ve combined occasions! Join us for the Har Shalom Annual Picnic followed by Shabbat under the Stars on Friday, Sept 6. We’ll meet at the Greenough Park picnic shelter at 6 pm. Sukkot is both a festival of agricultural and spiritual harvest. After the cleansing and renewal of the High Holidays, we rejoice under the sky in the flimsiest of structures, the Sukkah. We are grateful for the earth’s bounty that flows from the Divine.

**Setting up the Sukkah – Sunday, Sept 15, 10 am to noon.** Please come, and bring fresh or dried greens and flowers for decorations. We’ll also have arts and crafts supplies on hand for making sukkah decorations. Come and “take” the lulav, too!

**Sukkot Kabbalat Shabbat and vegetarian potluck – Friday, Sept 20, at 7 pm** Join us for Kabbalat Shabbat and a potluck in the sukkah. If the weather is wet, we’ll do it all indoors.

Simchat Torah: Celebrate, unroll the Torah and receive a blessing

**On Friday, Sept 27, we will observe Simchat Torah, beginning at 7 pm.** On Simchat Torah, we read the last words of Torah in Dvarim (Deuteronomy) and begin again at the beginning, Breishit (Genesis)! We’ll have a Kabbalat Shabbat service with music and dance, and if enough people come, we’ll unroll the whole Torah. It’s always amazing to see the whole scroll unrolled, visit the different books, recognize the unusual patterns in special sections, and appreciate the scribal oddities. This year, each person who holds the Torah will receive a blessing that is related to the place in Torah where they hold the scroll. Please come!

Yahrzeits

*The Yahrzeit is the Hebrew-calendar anniversary of a loved one’s death. The Hebrew date is invariant and is computed on the basis of the day and time of the deceased’s passing, but the corresponding civil calendar date changes each year.*

*In the list below, the Hebrew date appears listed first, followed by the current year’s civil date in parentheses. Yahrzeit candles are traditionally lit the evening before the specified date because the Jewish day begins at sunset of the previous day. At Har Shalom, we read our congregants’ Yahrzeits and recite the Mourner’s Kaddish at the Shabbat service before the Hebrew calendar Yahrzeit date.*
